TOURS AND WORKSHOPS FOR EARLY YEARS AND KEY STAGE I



ULTIMATE KIDS TOUR

(Led by castle historian) 30 mins (Max capacity 30 students)

Children learn the various areas and functions of the castle, from the ammonites in the Great Hall floor to the towers themselves. And what 5-year-old doesn't relish the chance to handle a real sword

Curriculum links

- KS1
- Significant historical events, people and places in their own locality.
- · Similarities and differences between ways of life in different periods.
- KS2
- A local history study

CASTLE LIFE

(led castle historian) (30 mins Max capacity 20 students, 4 adults)

The tour aims to teach the children basic information regarding life in medieval times through an exploration of people's jobs, wages and lifestyle

Curriculum links

KS1

Significant historical events, people and places in their own locality. Similarities and differences between ways of life in different periods.





ATTACK AND DEFENCE

(Castle Historian) (30 mins) (max capacity 30 students)

Pupils will be introduced to the main defensive structures of Warwick Castle and will learn methods of attack and how the garrison of the medieval castle would have repelled such attacks

Curriculum links:

- Significant events beyond living memory.
- · A post 1066 study of relevant local history

THE WIVES OF HENRY VIII

(led by castle historian) (45 mins) Max capacity 20 students 4 adults)

Using the waxwork display of Henry and his wives, this interactive workshop introduces students to one of the greatest and most famous stories in English history

Curriculum links

- the changing power of monarchs using case studies
- a significant turning point in British history.





NORMAN WARWICK 1066-1068

(led by castle historian) (30 mins max capacity 40 students)

To the backdrop of a Norman Motte Students will hear stories of the battle of Hastings and learn how William 1st consolidated his power by building Motte and Bailey castles.

Curriculum links

- Edward the Confessor and his death in 1066
- A post 1066 study of relevant local history
- · A significant turning point in history

SWORD AND BATTLE SKILLS

(led by Costumed Character 30 mins max capacity 30 students 4 adults)

This highly interactive workshop, students are introduced to a medieval man at arms and learn the discipline and skills needed to become a successful foot soldier.

Curriculum links

• A study of an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066





CRIME AND PUNISHMENT

(led by Castle historian (30 mins max capacity 30 students 4 adults)

This highly interactive workshop, Leads students on the history of Crime and Punishment from Saxon Times to the Witch trials of the 17th Century. Students will experience the Medieval Pillory, get up close to Medieval torture implements and be involved in a Witch trial. We can also offer the chance to visit the Castle Gaol, but please note that should you wish to include this, then the Maximum group size must be reduced to 16 students and 3 adults.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN OUR SCHOOL ARRIVES AT THE CASTLE?

Schools buses will be directed to the schools or main castle entrance, where they will be met and registered by a member of the education team and guided into the castle

CAN I PRE-BOOK LUNCH SPACES?

It is not currently possible to pre-book lunch spaces. Lunch provision is allocated on arrival, on a first come first served basis with preference given to the youngest school groups on any given day

NB Should a school have SEND considerations then it may be possibly to pre-book lunch space. In such cases schools would need to contact the Schools Officer.
