Towers and Ramparts (20/25 minutes)

Walk the Walls once manned by the castle's defenders. Climb to the top of Guys Tower from here, you wish, you can take the exit stairs back to the base of the tower to the castle courtyard.

You can, if you wish, exit on to the south rampart, explore the castle Barbican, climb on to explore the summit of Caesars tower. You will then exit to the base of the tower into the castle courtyard next to the Kingmaker exhibition.

England's' crown might have been in very different hands, were it not for the power of this mightiest of Warwick Castles War lords



Conquerors Fortress. (15/20 minutes)

Dominating the courtyard, the Mound is the oldest surviving part of the castle, having stood since castle was built in 1068 by William the Conqueror. The mound originally housed the stronghold for the castle, which was one of many strategically placed motte and bailey castles to aid William the Conqueror in his ongoing plan to solidify his control of EnglandWalk in the steps of William the Conqueror himself, as you climb our 11th Century Norman Motte.

The Great Hall and State Rooms (20/25 minutes including Royal Weekend party)

During the Middle Ages it was in the Great Hall that the Earl of Warwick ate, drank, and enjoyed entertainment with his court.

It was also where he would have dispensed justice.

Embellished over time, today it houses Warwick Castle's impressive collection of Arms and Armor. Follow the State Corridor to explore the splendour of the 17th and 18th century state Rooms, housing a beautiful collection of ornaments, furniture, paintings and more.

On the 25th of June 1898, Francis and Daisy Greville the 5th Earl and Countess of Warwick hosted a lavish house party for the Prince of Wales and his court.

They were a group of fast-living nobles, collectively known as the Marlborough set.

This exhibition brings to life the excitement, secrets and scandal that swept through this exclusive Victorian social event.






Castle Gaol (Jail) (15 minutes)

Descend beneath the mighty Caesars tower to Warwick Castles' original dungeon. A place of Torture pain and suffering.

See the Oubliette, where those condemned to its confinement were likely to be forgotten and left to a slow, agonizing death Look around the walls to see the 14th 15th and 17th century graffiti scratched into its walls by the long-forgotten unfortunates imprisoned long ago.





The Mill and Engine House (15 Minutes)

First constructed in the late 14th century, The Mill and engine House has used the power of the river Avon, to grind corn for the castles' kitchens, work power tools, such as lathes and saws. In 1884 an electricity generating plant was installed which supplied electricity in the form of direct current to the castle until 1940, when the castle was connected to the National Grid. The plant was abandoned completely in 1954.
